The Early Modern Women's Research Network (EMWRN) is an Australian-based network of scholars which aims to bring the often institutionally-isolated scholars of early modern women's writing into dialogue with others in the field, both within Australia and internationally. The network meets at major conferences, sponsoring panels and symposia, often in conjunction with other early modern networks. EMWRN currently holds a three-year grant from the Australia Research Council on the material cultures of early modern women's writing, investigating the production, transmission and circulation of early modern women's texts from the originary moment of their production to later redactions.
